Mafua 'i-Vai'utukakau Maka, Director for Tonga National Emergency Management Office	Mr. Mafua-'i-Vai'utukakau Maka is the Director for Tonga National Emergency Management Office. He is in this role starting 2019. Prior to assuming the top role at NEMO, he served NEMO as a Senior Manager for more than 15 years. In his capacity as a Director and as National Controller when there was a declaration of emergency, Mr. Maka has coordinated the national emergency response in many occasions on behalf government of Tonga, notably response to TC Gita in 2018, TC Harold in 2021 and recently Hunga Tonga Hunga Ha'apai Volcanic Eruption and resulting Tsunami on 15 Jan ((it gave our planet a bit of a shake). In his leadership, Tonga is moving to a more comprehensive disaster risk management approach heralding a significant legislative reform for Disaster Risk Management. Among others, Tonga has recently developed a new Disaster Risk Management Bill to replace the existing Emergency Management Act. The Bill is waiting for Royal Assent to come into effect. The Bill provides a legal set up in Tonga for the government and stakeholders to proactively work in risk identification and risk reduction in addition to preparedness and response. Tonga has also developed Disaster Risk Financing Strategy, another key document for Tonga. At the moment NEMO Tonga's focus is on developing Disaster Risk Management Regulations and National as well as Island Disaster Risk Management Policy. Mr. Maka is providing all the leadership as required in such significant policy changes in Tonga, which is equally a good reference for the region.
